Thank you for organising this opportunity for us.'



PRE Conference days

Our year 9 and year 10 boys participated in a PRE conference day during Wednesday and Thursday. Our boys worked with Catrin Hubbard (Sutton Schools Work), and her team of volunteers and youth workers. They delivered a high impact day revolving around the theme of poverty and 'loving thy neighbour'. Boys engaged in 6 workshops and talks throughout the day. They listened to Clare Alder's presentation from World vision as well as Jonathan Baxter who represented the Croydon Churches Floating Shelter initiative. In supplementary activities pupils consolidated this learning by exploring issues surrounding homelessness & fuel poverty with the PRE team.



At the end of the day the boys drew upon each of the talks and workshops in order to design a reflective response to everything they had participated in. As you can see some of their work is truly impressive, all the more since they completed this in 25-30 minutes. The engagement and participation from our boys was excellent, they did us all really proud! I owe a debt of gratitude to all members of staff who supported on the two days and in particular the English and Maths faculty who very generously allowed us to use their classrooms for the workshops.

It's been a busy few days for the 9s. Last Friday we welcomed the Stopwatch Theatre Company to school, who performed the very moving and powerful story of Daniel, a local Croydon lad, who tragically died from taking one MDMA tablet. The performance of 'I love you mum' was incredibly poignant, and the questions which followed from the 9s were insightful and inquisitive, demonstrating their engagement in what they had just experienced. The actors were delighted with how our students had responded and we are hoping to invite Daniel's mum into school, for a follow-up assembly to continue the PHSCE education around drugs and their dangers. Ros was so touched by what she had seen, she immediately adapted her Year 11 Drama lesson to incorporate some of the imagery from the play.



On Wednesday, Year 9 had their annual PRE day. It was lovely to see them all so interested in the messages from the guest speakers. 3 students were so motivated by what they heard that they are already working on their plan to fundraise for a homeless shelter in Croydon.

Finally, World Book Day saw the 9s transformed into cartoonists, with the guest illustrator John Byrne sharing tips of the trade. They all really enjoyed the session and several commented that they had learnt some very simple techniques to produce great images, even though they were 'rubbish at art' – their words not mine!

Schools to teach 21st century relationships and sex education

The government has today (1 March 2017) tabled amendments to the [Children and Social Work Bill](#) which will make it a requirement that all secondary schools in England teach relationships and sex education (RSE). A review and a period to gather expert opinions begins.

Relationships education, RSE, and PSHE are designed to ensure pupils are taught the knowledge and life skills they will need to stay safe and develop healthy and supportive relationships, particularly dealing with the challenges of growing up in an online world. This is something that we believe we have fully embraced at CBSC. We will continue to fully support and develop as an integral part of our appropriate, broad and balanced curriculum.

The government is proposing the introduction of the new subject of 'relationships education' in primary school and renaming the secondary school subject 'relationships and sex education', to emphasise the central importance of healthy relationships. The focus in primary school will be on building healthy relationships and staying safe. As children get older, it is important that they start to develop their understanding of healthy adult relationships in more depth, with sex education delivered in that context. It is intended that the DfE will set out suitable, age-appropriate content on RSE which focuses on mental wellbeing, consent, resilience, age-appropriate relationships and sex education, and keeping safe online. Regulations and statutory guidance will then be subject to full public consultation later this year, and we expect to see children and young people being taught this new curriculum in schools as soon as September 2019. Clearly a great deal of this is already being delivered as part of our current PSHCE and Pastoral programmes as well as within certain subjects.

Schools will have flexibility over how they deliver these subjects, so they can develop an integrated approach that is sensitive to the needs of the local community; and, in the case of faith schools, in accordance with their faith.

Once again we appear to be in step with national opinion and are innovative in the way our curriculum is delivered.
