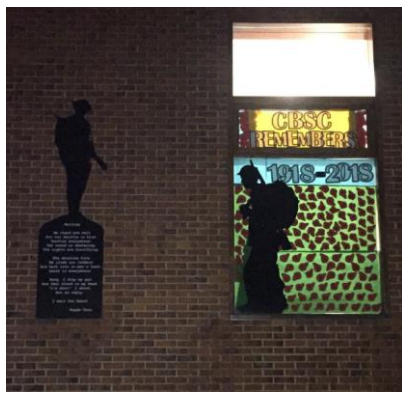




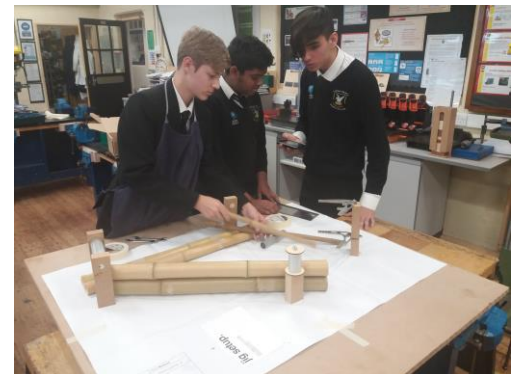
## CBSC Remembers, 1918-2018

On Friday morning, the Carshalton Boys community paid their respects in our annual Remembrance Ceremony. A two minutes' silence was held after the playing of the Last Post. Mr Barber (Principal), the Head Boys and Head Girls then laid wreaths at the school's war memorial, followed by a representative of each tutor group. The ceremony was part of a wider day of Remembrance activities, with a commemorative lunch being hosted in the canteen and They Shall Not Grow Old being shown after school on Friday to a group of 50+ keen Key Stage 4 historians. Assemblies were held last week in which students were asked to reflect on the importance of Remembrance and the futility and horror of war. All students have completed a commemorative poppy expressing their thoughts on why Remembrance is important and what it means to them personally, and their words are exhibited in a whole school Remembrance display. The level of respect shown throughout the Remembrance activities was exemplary by all members of the Carshalton Boys community. The day was very well-planned and organised by AimHigher South London, and capably delivered by staff and students from Goldsmith's, St Mary's and the Royal Veterinary College. It consisted of three sessions— 'Arts and Humanities', 'Bioscience and Veterinary Medicine' and 'Welcome to student life'. Our students were thoroughly engaged and behaved in an exemplary manner throughout the day.

Seeds were planted and conversations started that will continue over the coming years. Another incredibly valuable day facilitated by Lorna Ellis as part of our widening participation work.



## **University of Sussex Pharmacy Experience Day – 14<sup>th</sup> November**

This experience provided a practical insight into the study of Pharmacy and its associated career pathways. Students experienced what it is like to study Pharmacy at University and how A levels in Biology and Chemistry can be applied to studying a professional Pharmacy course.

During the day student interacted with scientists and rotated through a series of demonstrations and activities exploring different aspects of Pharmacy practice such as:

- the formulation of medicines
- the practice of clinical skills
- patient assessment

This highlighted the professional, scientific and clinical skills that are required for effective and safe practice and will include activities explicitly designed to build confidence with communication skills.

## Kingston University Lab in a Lorry – 12<sup>th</sup> November 2018

On Monday the University of Kingston visited us with two of their lab converted Lorries to deliver three workshops to boys in Year 7-10. These workshops included:

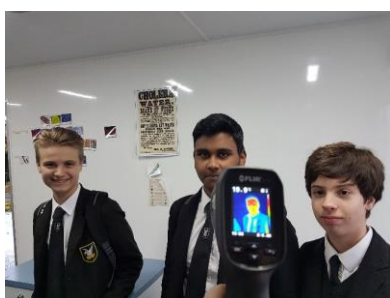
- Using HAL, the medical simulator robot doll, capable of seizures, breathing, pupil dilation and bleeding, to practice and perform Epi-Pen use for those in anaphylaxis
- Investigating signatures in fingerprinting as a criminal investigator
- Using and explaining how an infrared camera works
- Racing a remote controlled LEGO programmed robot around a course
- Creating CO<sub>2</sub> fairy liquid bubbles using dry ice
- Proving how acid rain is formed in our atmosphere using dry ice
