How you are tested

Paper 1: Listening, reading and writing.

What is assessed:

- Aspects of Hispanic society
- Artistic culture in the Hispanic world
- Multiculturalism in Hispanic society
- Aspects of political life in Hispanic society
- Grammar

How it is assessed:

Written exam: 2 hours 30 minutes, 50% of A-level

Paper 2: Writing

What is assessed:

- One text and one film or two texts from the list set in the specification
- Grammar

How it is assessed:

Written exam: 2 hours, 20% of A-level

Paper 3: Speaking

What is assessed:

- Individual research project
- One of four themes (Aspects of Hispanic society / Artistic culture in the Hispanic world / Multiculturalism in Hispanic society / Aspects of political life in Hispanic society)

How it is assessed:

• Oral exam, 21-23 minutes (including preparation time), 30% of A-level

What to do over the summer

- 1. Complete as much of the **grammar workbook** as you can. Ensure you cover **all** the tenses as **A MINIMUM**.
- 2. Research the **Spanish Civil War**: brief causes, aftermath (what life was like). Write at least 200 words in English summarising what you have found out.
- Log on daily to at least one of the websites below and read/watch news articles. Get them on your phone/follow them on Facebook so you can get regular updates.
